
Cardwell Tropical Mountain Bike Trails Project

Overview

The Cardwell Tropical Mountain Bike Trails Project (the Trails or the Project) includes the proposed development of a new 94km, 26-trail mountain bike network World Heritage rainforest in Cardwell, on the southern end of the Cassowary Coast. The Project is focused on establishing the region as a 'Ride Destination' and integrates and promotes the unique cultural heritage of the local Traditional Custodians, the Girramay People.

Ride in, ride out trails, located within 500m of the town centre and foreshore

Significant on-bike and off-bike spending and economic contribution to the Cassowary Coast

Why Mountain Biking?

Mountain biking is one of the fastest growing recreational and adventure tourism activities in Queensland and Australia. The appeal of the sport is wide ranging and is expected to continue to grow across a diverse riding demographic. This presents a significant opportunity for the Trails to attract visitors to Cardwell and the Cassowary Coast, which will generate significant socio-economic benefits for the region.



Next Steps

The Trails are a community-led initiative that has been jointly driven by the Cardwell community and the Girramay Peoples with the support of the Cassowary Coast Regional Council. All equally share the ambition to establish Cardwell as a 'Ride Destination' where locals and visitors can 'Ride where our ancestors once walked, Girramay Country'. It is important to maintain the momentum and strong advocacy for the Trails by implementing the following next steps:

01

Engage with key regional advocacy groups, such as Far North Queensland Regional Organisation of Councils (FNQROC) and Tourism Tropical North Queensland (TTNQ), to participate in discussions regarding the definition of regional mountain biking strategies and promotions.

02

Engage with the Queensland Government to seek support for progressing the Trails and to secure funding for the detailed environmental and cultural assessments, which are required prior to detailed design and construction ('Approvals and Due Diligence Process').

03

Commence the Approvals and Due Diligence Process as soon as practical, to assess the potential environmental and cultural heritage impacts for the Trails.
